So, I took my results from my exam and went out to the Masonic Homes and put in an application. Had an interview that day, did the drug test that same day. And, within two days they called me and said we'd like to have you come to work for us as a CNA. I was like jumping for joy.

Now, my mortgage company knows I have a stable job, a job that's needed. It feels better knowing that I'm getting up and going to work.

You know, I can remember, I think it was the second day, my son goes, “Where you going Dad?” I said, “I'm going to work.” He said, “You got a job?” I said, “Yeah, I got a job!” So the whole atmosphere of the family changes, too.

First of all, don't give up. Pray to God. And, get down to the Nia Center or the unemployment office and the Kentucky Career Center 'cause it really does work. If you apply yourself and have the will, it's there. Believe me, they're there to help you – and they don't stop.
