



KentuckianaWorks Human Capital Scorecard

January 2010

This sixth update of the *KentuckianaWorks Human Capital Scorecard* includes recently released data on college attainment of the adult population, enrollments and degrees awarded by level for postsecondary institutions, and the number of GED passers. In addition, the *Scorecard* presents data on educational attainment by age cohort. Finally, this update introduces a new metric for K-12 education, Eighth Grade Enrollment Based Graduation Rate, which measures the number of high school diploma recipients for a given year divided by the number of eighth graders enrolled four years previously. This figure has been shown to be very close to and track well over time with decennial census data calculations of the percentage of adults who have received regular high school diplomas.

The *Scorecard* provides these key measures of educational activity in the Louisville area along with a snapshot of the area's ranking among 16 comparison markets. The KentuckianaWorks board has stated that Louisville's economic future hinges on having a flexible and highly educated workforce; therefore, it is not acceptable to wait until after the 2010 census to determine if the community's improvement efforts have been successful. Hence, the organization commissioned this annual tracking system, so all stakeholders can monitor progress throughout the decade. The Louisville Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) or metro area consists of Clark, Floyd, Harrison, and Washington Counties in Indiana and Bullitt, Henry, Jefferson, Meade, Nelson, Oldham, Shelby, Spencer, and Trimble Counties in Kentucky.

This release supersedes previous versions of the *Scorecard*.

With data available through 2008, certain patterns are emerging in the *Scorecard* tracking:

- ❖ The percentage of Jefferson County and Louisville metro area adults with high school degrees continued to improve, inching up by about a percentage point in 2008. The percentage of adults with college degrees increased a bit as well. The Census Bureau's American Community Survey is subject to sampling error, and hence estimates can fluctuate year-to-year, but the overall pattern since 2000 is one of slow, but fairly steady, improvement in the high school and college attainment rates for Jefferson County and Louisville metro area adults.
- ❖ Of course, the competition is not standing still. According to the Census Bureau, high school and college attainment rates for most of the other 15 comparison metropolitan areas have risen at least as much as in the Louisville area. The latest rankings may indicate that Louisville is finally ready to make a sustained move up the rankings. Since

2004 Jefferson County has moved up an impressive eight places in the ranking among the central counties of the peer metros for high school attainment (7th from 15th) and is three places better in terms of college attainment (10th from 13th). Improvements in the Jefferson County Public Schools graduation rate (see below) seem to be paying off.

- ❖ The educational attainment rate data is foreshadowed in the public school graduation rates. Graduation data are available through the 2005-06 school year, and the last two years of data show a significant increase in school completions for both Jefferson County and the Louisville MSA. The graduation rate was well over 80 percent for each for the first time. But since every other MSA in the peer group has also experienced improvements in high school graduation rates, the Louisville area rankings remain about the same as in 2000, a respectable fifth best of the 16 comparison metros.
- ❖ The overall performance of the Louisville MSA is pulled down by the counties surrounding Jefferson County, whose high school and, especially, college attainment rates are significantly less than the MSA's central county.
- ❖ While more people have been completing high school, the percentage of adults over 25 who have only a high school education has remained fairly constant over the years. The Louisville MSA now has the highest percentage of adults who have only a high school degree among the peer metros.
 - ❖ When examining the educational attainment of the youngest adult age cohorts, people ages 25-34 and 35-44, the news is uniformly positive. The percentage of 25-34 year olds and 35-44 year olds who have a high school diploma or equivalent, who have attended at least some college, and who have earned a bachelor's degree are at all-time highs. Some of this improvement may be due to sampling error fluctuations, but the increases are large enough that it is likely they reflect a real trend. There were a few big jumps in the rankings: The younger of the two cohorts moved up three places to seventh in terms of high school graduates. The 35-44 year olds moved up four spots in terms of high school graduates – to fourth place among the comparison metros.
 - ❖ The 35-44 year olds moved from 16th into 14th place in terms of bachelor's degrees,
 - ❖ The 25-34 year olds jumped three spots to 11th place in terms of bachelor's degrees.
- ❖ A 100 fewer people completed a GED in 2008 than in 2007. With some yearly fluctuations, the annual number of GED completions in the Louisville area has consistently been around 2,000. Up through 2007 this sort of consistency had been the case for the entire group of comparison metros, but 2008 saw an increase of over 3,700 GEDs completed in the other 15 metros, an increase of 14 percent. Because of this, on a per capita basis, the Louisville MSA rank dropped from fourth place all the way to 10th place among the peer metros.
- ❖ Postsecondary institutions in the Louisville metro area saw a significant enrollment increase in 2008. The nearly 5 percent gain was dominated by part-time students (8 percent increase versus 2 percent for full-time students) and among institutions granting at most an associate's degree (10 percent increase versus just under 2 percent for

institutions granting bachelor's degrees). The majority of the enrollment increase occurred at Ivy Tech Community College, IU-Southeast, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and private career colleges such as Galen College of Nursing and Brown Mackie College.

- ❖ The enrollment figures seem to reflect the effects of the economic recession. While the Louisville MSA had among the largest enrollment increases, similar effects were found in many of the comparison metros, so Louisville's rankings remained fairly constant. The long-term trend since 2000, however, looks much better. Louisville is one of five of the peer metros that either rose or stayed even in the per capita enrollment rankings for each level of degree program, from associate to graduate and first professional, since 2000.
- ❖ At 8 percent, the overall increase in degrees awarded was even larger than the increase in enrollment. The level of associate's degrees and below led the way with a huge 21 percent increase in awards, mostly due to Jefferson Community and Technical College where there are now three times as many degrees and certificates awarded at this level than was the case during the 2000-2002 period. Louisville now ranks fifth among the peer metros in awards/certificates below the associate level (and fourth on a per capita basis).
- ❖ There was a nearly 9 percent increase in associate's degrees awarded, most of it attributable to Sullivan University and Galen College of Nursing. The number of bachelor's degrees awarded remained essentially level, reflecting enrollment trends of a few years ago. The growth in first professional degrees was due entirely to The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.
- ❖ Despite another year of award increases, Louisville's overall rank for awards, degrees, and certificates per capita remained at ninth place, but the area did jump two spots for associate's degrees. The Louisville area has been narrowing the gap between it and the metro areas just ahead of it in the rankings for all degree categories. The Louisville MSA has seen the fourth best increase in total degrees awarded per capita since 2000 among the comparison metros, ranking at least sixth best in each of the individual degree categories. In addition, Louisville is the only one of the peer metro areas that moved up since 2000 in the degrees awarded per capita rankings in every category of award, from below associate certificates and diplomas to graduate and first professional programs.

♣ Educational Attainment rates apply to population aged 25 and older. Source for education attainment in 1990 and 2000: U.S. Bureau of the Census, Summary File 4, 1990 & Summary File 3, 2000. Source for years 2001 through 2007 American Community Survey, with confidence intervals (precision of estimates) varying by year and place. Because information was not available for all MSAs for the years 2001 through 2004, comparisons were made among central counties. For the decennial census and 2005-07, the central county of the Richmond MSA is considered to include both the City of Richmond and adjacent Henrico County. However, the 2001-2004 American Community Surveys (ACS) did not include the city of Richmond VA within detailed Virginia city and county breakdowns; therefore Richmond is not included in the central county rankings for years 2001-2004. Calculations of educational attainment in the ACS did not include the group quarters population until 2006. Because many types of GQ populations have educational attainment distributions that are very different from the household population comparison of the 2006 data with previous years should be done with caution.

■ These figures reflect only those within the field described and not any higher level of education.

♣ Source: Eighth Grade(t-4) Graduation Rate is calculated from enrollment and diploma data in the Common Core of Data collected by the National Center for Education Statistics. The rate is constructed by taking the number of diploma recipients for a given school year divided by the fall enrollment for grade 8 from four years prior. Thus the graduation rate for 2006 is number of diploma recipients for 2005-06 divided by the number of eighth graders in the fall of 2001-02. This figure has been shown to be very close to and track well over time with Decennial Census data calculations of the percentage of adults who have received regular high school diplomas. 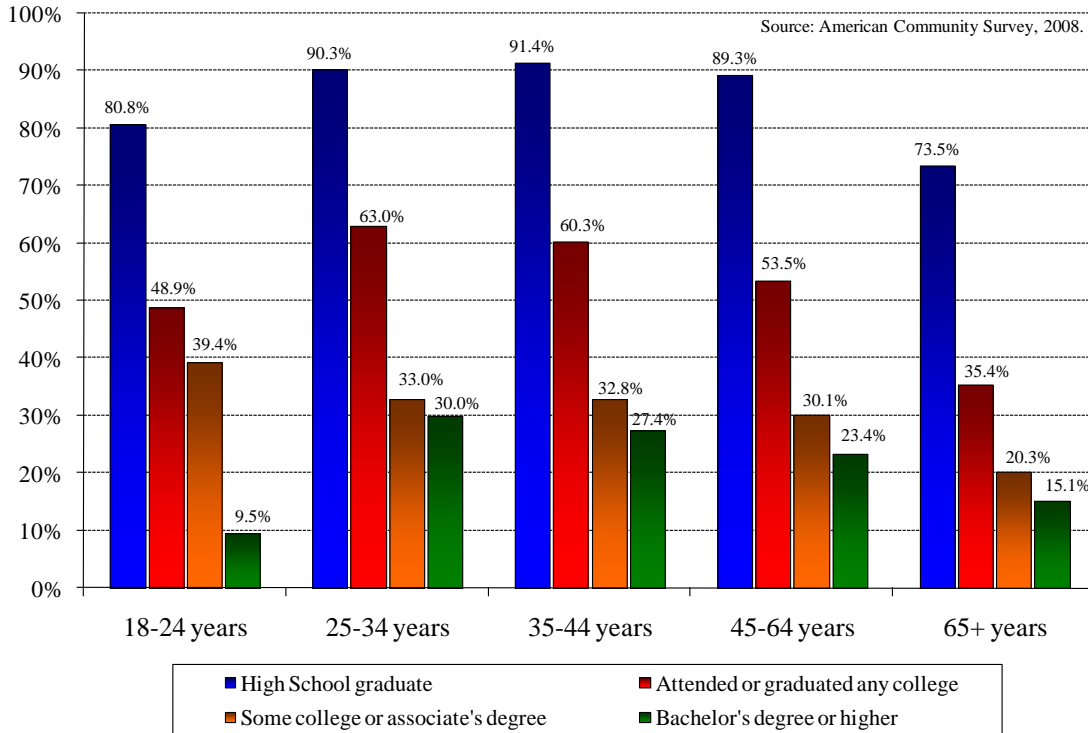

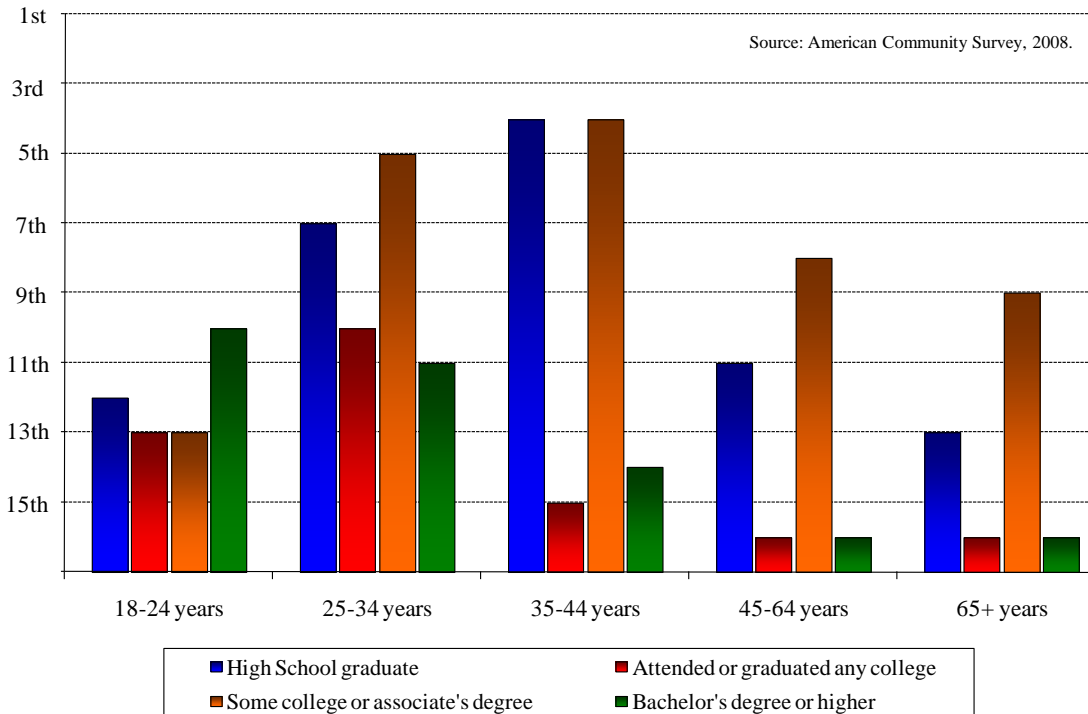


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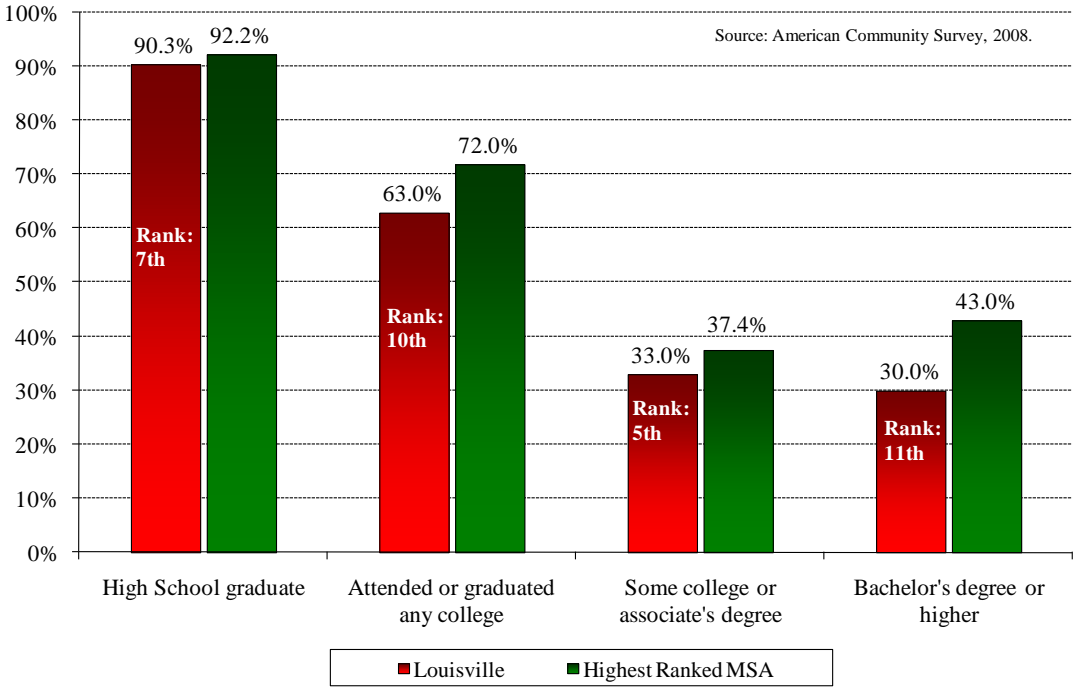
Educational Attainment in the Louisville MSA by Age, 2008



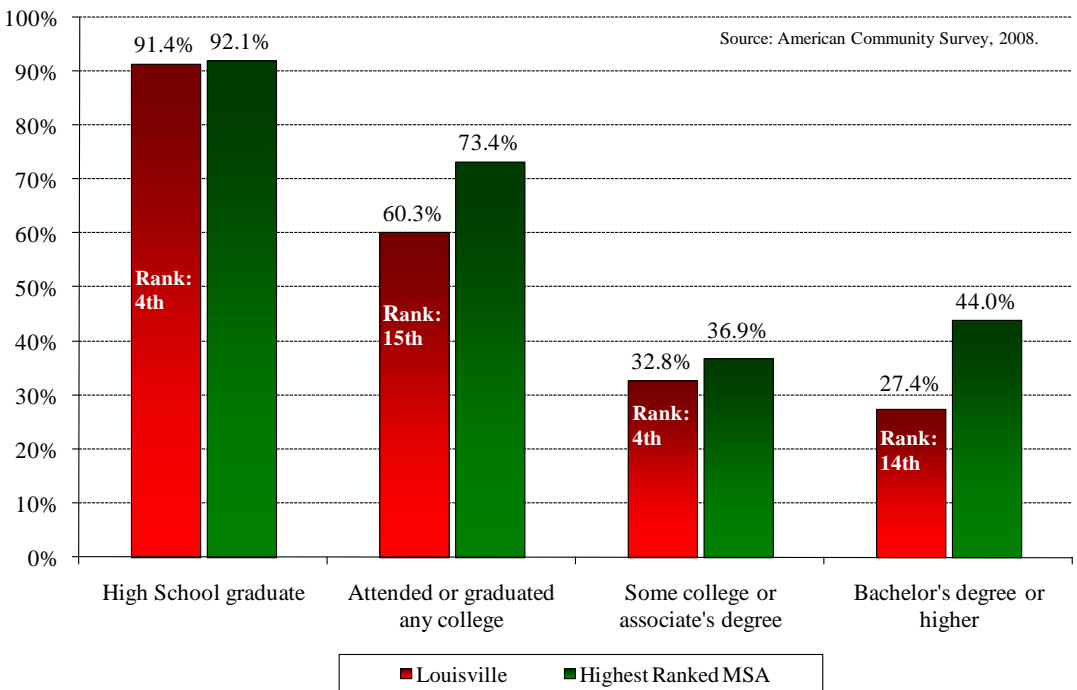
Educational Attainment, 2008 Louisville MSA Rank Among 16 Peer Metros

This supplement to the *KentuckianaWorks Human Capital Scorecard* presents data on postsecondary degrees awarded in certain fields that are seen as being the most directly related to long-term economic development. These strategic fields are the STEM disciplines of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, and all health care related fields. STEM fields include agricultural and plant sciences, environmental science, computer and information sciences, science and technical teacher education, engineering, engineering technology, biology/biological sciences, mathematics, and all the physical sciences. Health care related fields include teacher education, clinical and counseling psychology, chiropractic medicine, dentistry and related fields, medical doctor training, pharmacist training, nursing and related health services, allied health, and health sciences fields. The data come from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) administered by the National Center for Educational Statistics.

This report covers data from 2004 through 2008. Certain trends and recent developments are highlighted below.

- ❖ In 2008 the overall number of degrees awarded in the STEM fields increased from the fairly constant level seen in previous years. There were 100 more degrees awarded in these fields during the 2007-2008 academic year than were previously awarded during 2006-2007, about a 7 percent increase. This was entirely due to a 65 percent increase in the number of awards below the associate's degree level. The number of degrees awarded at each of the higher levels remained at their recent historic levels.
- ❖ The increase above is reflected in the STEM rankings among the peer metro areas. Louisville moved up a rank for both overall STEM degrees (9th from 10th) and awards below the associate degree level (4th from 5th). Louisville also advanced a rank for master's degrees, but only to a previously achieved rank (5th), but lost ground in the rankings for associate's degrees despite a nearly identical number of awards.
- ❖ Louisville does very well relative to its peers in the lower level of STEM degrees, but quite poorly at the bachelor's degree level. On a positive note, the Louisville area's trend for bachelor's degrees on a per capita basis is positive, having moved from 15th to 13th place since 2004. While enrollment has recently increased at IU-Southeast and Bellarmine University, and the academic level of incoming freshmen at the University of Louisville has been increasing, those factors have not yet translated into more degrees granted in the STEM fields.

- ❖ On a per capita basis, Louisville has shown the best trend among the peer metros since 2004 in degrees in STEM fields. Louisville has moved up in the rankings for total degrees and all levels of degree, except for Master's degrees where Louisville has held steady.
- ❖ Degrees awarded in health care related fields have increased markedly since 2004, all of it at the undergraduate level. At the bachelor's degree level, IU-Southeast, Bellarmine University, and University of Louisville have all nearly doubled the degrees they award in health care related fields.
- ❖ Despite the dramatic increases in awards at the bachelor's degree level and below, Louisville has not advanced much, if at all, in the peer rankings, indicating that increases are a general trend across the country. On a positive note, Louisville now awards the second most doctoral degrees in health care related fields of the peer metros. This is due to new programs at Bellarmine and Spalding Universities.
- ❖ On a per capita basis, Louisville has a mixed record since 2004 in degrees in health care related fields. Louisville has moved up the rankings for total degrees and at the associate's level, but has dropped in the rankings at the levels of graduate degrees (master's and doctoral combined) and first professional degrees.
- ❖ In terms of the percentage of all degrees awarded in these strategic sectors, Louisville generally ranks just below the middle of the pack of peer metros. Louisville's percentage of degrees in the strategic sectors is above the average in the comparison metros only at the associate's degree level (45 percent versus 42 percent), but is farthest below the average at the below associate's degree level (44 percent versus 56 percent).
